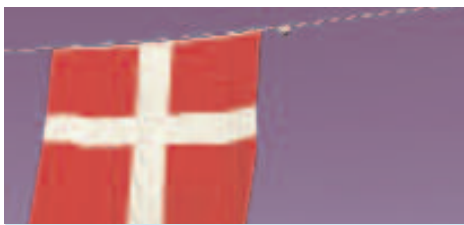




## COPENHAGEN, DENMARK > EXCHANGE



### EXCHANGE OVERVIEW

If you are seeking a highly independent and culturally immersed study abroad program, an exchange may be right for you. On an exchange program, you will enroll directly at one of our partner universities and take your classes with local students. This model offers levels of authenticity and autonomy that are not often available through other study abroad programs. Our exchange partners include prestigious institutions in several countries and most offer courses in English.

Participating in an exchange is affordable and simple: while you are participating on an exchange program, you will pay regular BU tuition to BU and your financial aid will apply as usual. Courses you take abroad will appear on your transcript as BU credits. Explore the exchange options below and contact Marisa Crowley to begin planning for your exchange.

## Copenhagen: University of Copenhagen

### HOST INSTITUTION

With almost 33,000 students and more than 6,000 employees, the University of Copenhagen is the largest institution of research and education in Denmark. The purpose of the University—to quote the University Statute—is to “conduct research and provide further education to the highest academic level.”

Approximately one hundred different institutes, departments, laboratories, centers, museums, etc., form the nucleus of the University. The campus consists of various environments ranging from the plant world of the Botanical Gardens, through the high-technology laboratories and auditoriums, to the historic buildings and lecture rooms of Frue Plads and other locations. ### EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Boston University students have the opportunity to directly enroll at one of Europe’s top universities, the University of Copenhagen, for a semester or an academic year. This exchange program will be of interest to students in all undergraduate fields, especially political science, history, economics, international relations, psychology and sociology, among many others. There is no prior language requirement, and instruction is available in both English and Danish. Limited places are available.

Upon successful completion of a semester students earn 12 to 20 Boston University credits.

### HOUSING

Limited space is available in university housing. Many students at the University of Copenhagen find off-campus accommodations. The university can offer some assistance finding housing.

Fall Semester: August–December

### APPLICATION DEADLINES

Fall Semester/Academic Year: March 15  
 Spring Semester: October 1

### 2015/2016 PROGRAM COST

Students will pay Boston University tuition for the semester or academic year that they are abroad. Participants pay separately for housing, board, airfare, and other incidentals.
