Lesson Hebrews 10:32–11:1

Lector: A lesson from the epistle to the Hebrews, chapter 10, verse 32,

through chapter 11, verse 1:

But recall those earlier days when, after you had been enlightened, you endured a hard struggle with sufferings, sometimes being publicly exposed to abuse and persecution, and sometimes being partners with those so treated. For you had compassion for those who were in prison, and you cheerfully accepted the plundering of your possessions, knowing that you yourselves possessed something better and more lasting. Do not, therefore, abandon that confidence of yours; it brings a great reward. For you need endurance, so that when you have done the will of God, you may receive what was promised. For yet "in a very little while, the one who is coming will come and will not delay; but my righteous one will live by faith. My soul takes no pleasure in anyone who shrinks back." But we are not among those who shrink back and so are lost, but among those who have faith and so are saved. Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

Lesson 2 Corinthians 5:16–20

Lector: A lesson from the second epistle to the Corinthians, chapter 5, verses 16–20:

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors

for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God.



The Spirit came upon prophets and teachers,



Likewise after supper he took a cup, And when he had given thanks, he gave the cup to his disciples, saying: "Drink this, all of you; this is the sign of a new covenant, sealed with my blood, for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Each time you drink this, remember me."

On the day you raised him from the dead he was recognized by his disciples in the breaking of the bread, and in the power of the Holy Spirit, your Church has continued in the breaking of the bread and the sharing of the cup.

And so, in remembrance of these your mighty acts in Jesus Christ, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving as a holy and living sacrifice, in union with Christ's offering for us, as we proclaim the mystery of faith.
