## Information

- Enrollment in CO 201 during the second semester freshman year is contingent upon completion of WR 100 in the first semester. Students who take WR 097, WR 098 or WR 099 in the fall should consult with an academic counselor for advice on what to take in the spring.
- Students may be exempted from the foreign language requirement based on a score of 560 or higher on the SAT II, AP/IB or transfer credit or the Boston University language placement examination.
- Course offerings change and the listed classes are not available every semester. Be sure to check if the courses you select have any prerequisites.
- Students may not count a course for both a liberal arts requirement and the CAS Focus. Courses can not count for more than one requirement.
- Physical education or any one-credit music, art or officer's training program courses do not count toward the total number of credits needed to graduate.
- If you wish to fulfill a liberal arts requirement with a course not on this list, you MUST file a petition with Undergraduate Affairs BEFORE registering for that course.
