William Anthony, Ph.D. announces retirement

William Anthony, Ph.D., Executive Director of the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation has announced his retirement. Dr. Anthony was a Professor in the department of Rehabilitation Sciences, Sargent College of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences, at Boston University. He was the recipient of several awards including the American Association of Psychosocial Rehabilitation (AAPR) Fordyce Award in Psychiatric Rehabilitation (2002).

Dr. Anthony, one of the founders of the modern movement in psychiatric rehabilitation, has stated that he will continue to be active in the field. 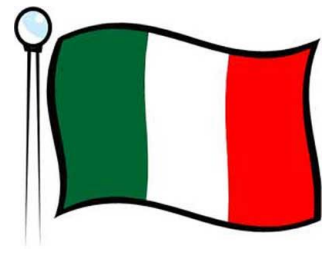

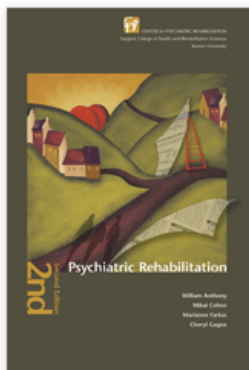
