Boston University Henry M. Goldman School of Dental Medicine (GSDM) is committed to scientific scholarship in dental medicine. Student involvement in research plays a fundamental role in the mission of the School. Because of its ongoing contributions to new knowledge through biomedical research and education, GSDM has become a leader in oral health care.

When can AS students do research?

The School offers elective research opportunities to AS students starting the second semester of the first year. Students need to apply for research at least one month before their intended starting date. Students need to consider their availability for at least 4 hours per session, 12 hours per week, when applying for biomedical research. Students must maintain a 3.0 GPA or higher in their didactic and clinical courses to be considered for research training.

Research environment at GSDM

The research facilities include modern biomedical core facilities and ample laboratory space and comprise:
