DTG Happenings

It is not our typical spring semester in DTG; with campus closure and social distancing, we are found on opposite ends of the country and world. Some DTG members went as far as Japan to make it home, while others remain in their Boston apartments for the time being. While the distances we have traveled are different, we are all grappling with feeling far away from one another and our normal routines. In order to help DTG members cope with the current situation, the executive board has continued our efforts to create social connection in a time of distancing. We host DTG Zoom "parties" every Thursday where members are invited online to chat and catch up with one another. Soon we will begin introducing games and other activities. Our social media chair, Angelica Breece-Sullivan, has worked hard to keep our social media alive, especially in implementing weekly improvisation prompts to motivate dancers to move and share movement. Lastly, our Concert Coordinator, Olivia Blaisdell and Avery Pelosi (CC in training) are working hard to organize Virtual Visions which will showcase our dedicated choreographers and their casts along with alumni. It is clear that limiting social gatherings and non-essential travel has impacted our semester in many ways. Two pieces with large casts were chosen to perform there: Zeina Fayad's ode to Amélie and Olivia Blaisdell's beach towel piece. The 12 person cast worked hard every week to adapt the pieces to a smaller group and stage. Much of the efforts took place behind the scenes, where members of the executive board and our advisors worked with the Student Activities Office at BU to get our trip approved. While we were not able to go to ACDA this year, these efforts are not in vain. We applaud all the members of the cast and those who helped plan this event; it truly brought us closer together even though the final event did not happen. Additionally, the two pieces selected are able to receive remote feedback from the ACDA adjudicators, which we

Virtual Visions

DTG is happy to present an innovative, experimental show called

VIRTUAL VISIONS to replace our typical spring semester show that takes place in BU Dance Theater. This idea was brainstormed by DTG's Concert Coordinator after BU's decision to go remote for the remainder of spring semester. Although we will miss performing in person for all of our friends, family and alumni, we are excited to explore this new, virtual way of presenting our work. In order to adapt our show to a virtual platform, we reached out to the original choreographers of Visions 2020 and asked them if they would participate by collaborating with their casts to create a 2-3 minute dance, one that is similar or completely different to their original idea. Another way DTG members could participate in the virtual show this semester is through weekly DTG improvisation prompts.

Anyone is able to send in a video of themselves dancing within the parameters of our prompt to be featured on DTG's social media and in our virtual production. For a finale, we have a clubwide movement chain. The participation is completely voluntary and many have decided to sign up to be a part of it. This project will consist of about an 8 count of movement by one person and then the next participant in the chain will incorporate the ending of the other's movement into the beginning of their movement. After we compile these beautiful videos, we will add it to the ending of our virtual show. Virtual Visions will be broadcasted onto Youtube and Facebook LIVE on April 23rd at 7pm EST for you all to see. We are excited to see the ways in which choreographers adapt this semester using platforms such as Zoom, Facetime, or pre-recorded videos

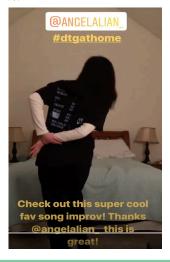
