Wikis, Blogs and Journals - oh MY!



increase their level of online discussion and

collaboration outside of class, Wikispaces has undergone a successful Fall 2015 pilot involving two classes and one administrative department. These are LS308 (taught by Marta Villar), LJ250 (taught by Keith Vincent), and the MLCL Wiki. Two more classes are in development for Spring 2016 delivery, with hopes to expand in AY 2016-17.



Blogs are the most dynamic and versatile resources for **Blogs** are the most dynamic and versatile resources for engaging students in asynchronous online discussion. In French, Arabic, Chinese, and other languages, we have

heard about the use of blogs mainly in two platforms: **Blogger** and **Wordpress**. The former is part of the Google suite of applications, and the latter is how we publish departmental web content. Meanwhile, **Blackboard's** own blog has limited functionality but has the advantage of being built into the course management system—a plus especially for assessment using the Blackboard Grade Center.



In addition to wikis and blogs, many faculty don't know that **Journals** can be used within any of our Blackboard courses in order to have electronically mediated response papers and/or journals that are private between the students and their instructors. If you are not turned off by the click-intensiveness of Blackboard in general, using Journals can give you an ongoing and actionable feed of information

from your students about their learning as its develops. Here too, you can provide personalized feedback to complete the communications loop and offer just-in-time coaching and/or a personalized assessment of student learning.

Update on Hybrid-Online Instructional Development

Turkish Lecturer Esra Ozdemir and African Languages Lecturer Zoli Mali are the first CAS faculty to have developed and taught hybrid-online course in the Less Commonly Taught Languages (LCTLs). Sponsored by a DLI Seed Grant, their development work involved student course builders and Geddes staff along with each of the faculty members. Blackboard, Camtasia, and Adobe Connect are the primary technologies used for the courses. During Faculty Development Week in Geddes this past fall semester, these pilot

faculty teamed up with Etsuko Okita Snyder to offer a panel discussion on the opportunities for distance teaching and learning, as well as the challenges they faced.

Going forward, we hope to continue to make this development work possible not only for continued offerings in African Languages and Turkish, but also to add additional languages based on the template developed. Creative approaches to further funding of development in this area are being proposed, relying on a variety of sources and models.

Collaborative Partnerships

As the Geddes Center has expanded its offerings to include funded projects and more digital learning development and support, there have been numerous opportunities to connect and collaborate with existing support entities at BU. So far, our most frequent and diverse partnering involves:

- Krasker Film/Video Service in Mugar Library
- The BU Summer Term Office

Much of our work in Geddes involved more than one collaborative partner at once. An example is working together to develop and offer our next online language course during the summer with Donna Shea, Dean of Summer Term and the Eric Freedman, Director of Distance Education.

Antidote Software for French Writing

Antidote 8 is a comprehensive French spelling and grammar correction tool that students can use to analyze their written work. Our Antidote license has been increased to cover the entire PC side of the lab, currently 18 stations running running Atidote 8 on Windows 8. Liliane Duséwoir has spearheaded the



effort to bring this software to the lab over the last few years; she welcomes inquiries directly for anyone interested in learning more about it.
