

10 Tips on Networking and Job Search in the U.S. from BU International Alumni

- 1. Plan ahead and start applying early!
- 2. Get involved in campus activities as a way to stand out.
 - a. On-campus jobs can help build your resume.
 - b. Leadership roles in clubs can help you acquire important skills.
- 3. Discover what you are passionate about and be genuinely interested in the fields you may be entering.
- 4. Volunteering or unpaid internships are a good way to gain experience in the field that you are interested in.
- 5. Start building relationships with your BU professors, classmates, and alumni.
- 6. Spend a lot of time preparing for your job search.
 - a. Attend Center for Career Development (CCD) workshops on resume building, networking, and interviewing in the U.S.
 - b. Work with a CCD career advisor to practice interview questions.
 - c. Develop a portfolio of your work (in addition to your resume and cover letter).
 - d. LinkedIn is a great tool to build your network and research and follow the companies you are interested in. AngelList is a good platform for students interested in working for startup companies.
 - e. Reflect on your international identity (bi-cultural background, language skills) and formulate a perspective of what you bring to a company or a position.
- 7. Be proactive in your job search. Identify the companies you want to work for.
 - a. Once you understand their needs, update your skills accordingly.
 - b. Follow their hiring cycles and apply strategically.
 - c. Try to find a connection, or reach out directly, but do a lot of research beforehand.
- 8. Be as informed as possible about how work authorization works, take ownership of the process, and advocate for yourself.
- 9. There are a lot of benefits to networking, including knowledge exchange and self-discovery!
- 10. Don't get discouraged and don't give up! Don't get caught up thinking about the competition or that you are falling behind. You will eventually find the right position for you.
