- Introductions
- Associate Dean of GRS Emily Barman
 - GRS is interested in helping GSO and working with us
 - They want to know what our issues and concerns are related to improving the life and process of being a graduate student at BU
 - They have 2 Initiatives as a part of CAS Strategic plan that are relevant for us:
 - 1. Improving support for alternative careers
 - Department or college level support is of interest
 - 2. Improving diversity and inclusion
 - Focusing on recruitment and retention
 - GRS is interested in organizing more co-sponsored events with GSO
 - What kind of events could we plan for graduate students to help create a sense of community?
 - They could help support some of our new initiatives related to Professional Development and Social events
 - i.e. Red Sox game
 - They particularly would like to hear from us and get suggestions
- Our response to Dean Barman
 - We will continue to monitor the diversity committee
 - How can we be involved? The structure of their diversity efforts are ambiguous right now
 - The only clear action was that a provost position was created
 - We are going to be in communication with them
 - We could be involved on a committee
 - We would like to be involved in creating the curriculum
 - Suggestions:
 - Having a multicultural event would be helpful
 - Booths with food from different cultures
 - Should we fundraise?
 - We have been supported fairly well by GRS
 - Graduate Student Advisory Board Provost Daniel Kleinman is also looking for feedback and Jessica and Sarabeth are on the committee and can be our voice
 - Oct 14th Colloquium about fear in academia
 - Jessica will send a flier out
 - Panels:
 - How to get through a dissertation
 - Prepare for the job market as a scholar
 - What does it mean to be a marginal body in academia
- Adam Kleinberger, Associate Ombuds
 - Adam Kleinberger, the Associate Ombuds at BU visited the GSO to inform students about the services the Office of the Ombuds can offer graduate students. The office has two practitioners, Adam and University Ombuds Francine

Montemurro. The Ombuds Office talks with students, faculty, and staff about concerns and issues. The office is an independent, impartial, informal problemsolving resource. The office maintains strict confidentiality, and provides a safe place to have off-the-record conversations on issues related Boston University. They are there to be helpful, and it is a free service.

The Ombuds Office at BU follows four ethical principles: (1) independence, (2) confidentiality (unless imminent risk of serious harm), (3) impartiality/neutrality and (4) informality.

The Ombuds Office offers services like, help with student-advisor conflict, clarification of a policy or process, exploring concerns about unethical or inappropriate behavior, help with interpersonal conflicts, and advice on having a difficult conversation. The Ombuds is not authorized to receive notice of claims against the University, but the Ombuds can help you identify the formal channels you can use for this purpose.

- Questions:
 - Are they open on the weekends?
 - They are generally open during normal hours and can talk on the phone, but they would also be willing to meet on the weekend if necessary for a visitor's schedule
 - They are not an emergency service in these cases you should call the police or health services
 - What makes you different than counseling (i.e. behavioral medicine)?
 - Behavioral Medicine has backgrounds in health care. The Ombuds backgrounds are in conflict management, negotiation, etc.
- Alex Yen, Representative for the GAAC Graduate Academic Affairs Committee
 - There have been 2 meetings of this committee and Alex would like to get input from GSO
 - The committee has ~8 people, 3-4 professors and 2 graduate students, staff? Dean Barman facilitates
 - Questions were brought up that were very relevant to us
 - i.e. Should graduate students keep their health insurance when on a leave of absence?
 - Everyone said yes very strongly, but these are very important issues we should be aware of and have a say in
 - Adding classes to the history department
 - Adding a new track to archeology
 - Also in charge of the academic conduct
 - Etc.
 - Emily oversees this, she is good at organizing the committee

- If there are concerns about previous points, she goes back and makes a new change and proposes the changes again
- How can we collect opinions from GSO?
 - Alex can send the agendas as soon as they come out (unfortunately the meetings are in between GSO meetings and they only send out the agendas a week before, so we won't be able to have an in person discussion about the agendas)
 - Alex will also send us the notes from all of the meetings
- Functionally how should we collect votes?
 - We probably want to see an example of an agenda before deciding
 - There could be a google form
 - Could send out a Google spreadsheet and add columns each time we vote on an issue
- Does this overlap with the Graduate Advisory Board for the Provost?
 - We don't know
- If anyone knows who else is on any of these committees, please let us know
 - Could we ask Emily for this?
