I would like to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to Boston University and the entire University community for their longstanding commitment to, and support for, the Humphrey Program.



#### **GRADUATION 2012**

The 2011/12 Boston University Humphrey Fellows graduation ceremony was a particularly prominent event. Our commencement speaker was Anne L. Howard-Tristani, niece of former U.S. vice-president and U.S. senator from Minnesota, Hubert H. Humphrey, and Vice-Chancellor for International, Federal and Corporate Affairs at the Universidad del Este in Puerto Rico. We were fortunate that she found time out of her busy schedule to deliver such an inspirational speech. Speaking on "The Celebration of Hubert H. Humphrey's Life and Legacy: How He Became the Conscience of the Nation," she emphasized that Hubert Humphrey's many pioneering roles, from human rights bills to his contributions to programs such as the Peace Corps and the Food for Peace Program, "are enormous accomplishments that should be celebrated."

Through the lens both of a scholar and a loving niece, Ms. Howard-Tristani spoke of her uncle as a man of great hope and eternal optimism, as well as a statesman, whose passionate vision, principles, and deeds made a huge difference in modern America, saying, "Humphrey genuinely believed in each and every individual's potential for creativity and ability to pursue excellence." Our Fellows were very proud when Ms. Howard-Tristani called

the program and the Fellows "Hubert H. Humphrey's greatest legacies and tributes to his life." She expressed her belief that, as future leaders in their countries, our graduates will carry on her uncle's good work and will help to solve the challenges that confront our world today. This will be a true contribution to Hubert H. Humphrey, a Happy Warrior's immortality.

Following Ms. Howard-Tristani was David Tomadze, Humphrey Fellow 2011/12, selected by the Fellows to represent them as class speaker. He thanked the many members of the audience who provided support and inspiration from the first day of their Humphrey year: "This University has equipped us with cutting-edge knowledge; we can feel the support of our families; the Humphrey Program gave us the courage to act." Like a world-class orator, David looked to the future while emphasizing the significance of the present occasion as "a major milestone in every Fellow's personal and professional life." The Fellows were especially moved when David called upon them to seize the gift they had been given and "act today, no matter whether you are going to lead your community or your nation." 

# **Graduation 2012**

























Anita Székely (Hungary, 2011/12) recently published research on "Response Measures to the Financial Crisis in the United States." She says: "After several years of deregulation in the U.S. financial markets, a new era started in 2010, with the enactment of the most comprehensive regulatory reform since the 1930s. The Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act and connecting new regulations were responses to the 2008 financial meltdown. Congress addressed a wide variety of issues believed to have contributed to the financial crisis and created a new regulatory landscape. This paper aims to provide a comprehensive overview of those current macro and micro prudential measures which fundamentally affect the banking industry in the United States. Furthermore, it introduces the ways in which the main constituents of the shadow banking system have been brought under the supervisory umbrella and how these markets have become more transparent. The post-crisis regulatory reforms which have transformed the supervisory architecture and affected the roles and responsibilities of the main supervisory agencies in the U.S. are also elaborated in the study. Finally, the paper highlights two important areas of the U.S. financial system which require immediate reform." (See page 10 for photo.)

#### 2011/12 Fellow Morvin Williams

is Senior Examiner at the Financial Services Regulatory Commission in Antigua and at the time of writing, he was studying in the United States as a Hubert H. Humphrey Fellow.

A truly rewarding experience! Those words, in essence, capture my opinion about the Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program. During my 2011/12 Fellowship year at Boston University (BU), I was engaged in a wide variety of academic, professional, social, and cultural activities, which ensured the primary objectives of the program were achieved. With its core component of leadership development and enhancement, the program was flexible and allowed me to choose various courses at BU, all of which helped to broaden my knowledge. In addition, I had the privilege of attending many seminars and conferences, and in so doing, I was fortunate to meet and interact with luminaries from a wide cross section of professional disciplines. Taking advantage of such networking opportunities which the program affords will certainly go a long way in my career development. The professional affiliation component, whereby I was affiliated with an institution in the United States that was engaged in a discipline similar to my professional career, afforded me the opportunity to study the U.S. approach to regulation and supervision.

Having participated in the Fellowship Program, I have built long-lasting friendships and working relationships with other Fellows from many countries. This international reach as facilitated by the program ensures that my network of professionals is very wide and diverse. As our global village becomes ever larger, the Fellowship Program exposed me to the various cultural and social differences that make us all unique. Notably, I have had the opportunity to share many things about my home country, not only with the other Fellows, but also with my American friends. Being in the United States, the Fellowship provided me with the opportunity to visit other states both on program-related activities and on initiatives organized individually.

With all these major achievements, it was truly an enriching Humphrey year that was spent at BU!



In 2012, we received the wonderful news that 2009/10 Fellow Shubhalaxmi Vaylure's project, "Capacity Development of Indian Mid-Level Professionals from Environmental NGOs," was selected for funding under the Alumni Engagement Innovation Fund (AEIF). Of the eight projects from South and Central Asia, her project is one of two that were selected from India.

Shubha has also started offering her first professional grant-writing workshop. Her organization has benefited from these skills and now she has begun to mentor others.

Shubha writes:

I am extremely happy to inform you all that winning the AEIF grant has made a huge impact on my career. The grant helped me in getting noticed by the management of the Bombay Natural Historical Society (**BNHS**). I have now been promoted to Deputy Director. For the last two years, I had repeatedly asked my management to give me bigger challenges, and I did a couple of management workshops to prove my mettle, but nothing convinced them.

When the news of winning the grant reached our president, he called for a meeting wherein he asked me to create an organizational development plan. I told him that I had returned from Boston with this dream. After 20 years at BNHS, developing such a plan was much easier, especially after my training in Boston. I was then offered a position in organizational development works. I will be working in areas such as fundraising, marketing, staff training, enhancement of online presence through website and social media networks, helping sustain weak departments of BNHS, and more.

I am surprised at how well the AEIF grant made everything fall into place with no loose ends. If this grant can bring so many miraculous changes before the start of the project, I can imagine what impact it will have on my career once I complete it.

I also started offering my first professional grant-writing workshop. Professor Maloney's class on fundraising was so useful to me that in the past two years, I have written more than 25 grants, of which 16 were successful.

I wish to offer my deep gratitude to Dr. Khinchuk, who persuaded me to look beyond my field and study management. If not for her conviction, I would have never taken so many classes at the School of Management. I also have gratitude for all my professors, who diligently taught the lessons so well that their words have been imprinted on my memory forever. Lastly, I am grateful to the fantastic Hubert Humphrey Fellowship Program, which truly grooms leaders of tomorrow. I am so happy to share my success with you all, as each of you has been a part of this lovely experience which I continue to cherish. Thank you to all of you.

#### In Memoriam



John R. Silber (Hon.'95), the president emeritus and former chancellor who led the transformation of Boston University from a commuter school to a renowned research institution, passed away from kidney failure on Thursday, September 27, 2012, at age 86.

Dr. Silber came to Boston University in 1971 as the University's seventh president. He served for more than three decades, as president until 1996, then as chancellor from 1996 to 2003. He also was a College of Arts & Sciences professor of philosophy and of international relations, a University Professor, and a School of Law professor of law.

Dr. Silber was strong-willed, outspoken, and often controversial, and his resolute work ethic, formidable capacity for knowledge, and dogged determination to improve both BU and the city of Boston made him well-known in academic as well as political circles.

Ruth-Ann Mellish Harris passed away suddenly on September 5, 2012, at Beth Israel Hospital in Boston. She was born in Liberia, West Africa, on March 11, 1936, and completed BA, MA, and PhD degrees at Tufts University. In 1954, she married John R. Harris, and they enjoyed a marriage that flourished for 58 years and one day. She is survived by her husband and their three children, Catherine, Dorothy, and Rees, and eight grandchildren.

John and Ruth-Ann lived with their family in Illinois and Massachusetts since 1966, with extended periods of time in Ibadan,

Nigeria; Nairobi, Kenya; and Jakarta, Indonesia. In Nairobi, Ruth-Ann taught at Starehe Boys High School, which was the transformational experience that caused her to return to complete her higher education. She later was a professor of history and Irish studies at Boston College until her death, and she participated in early efforts to bring the opposing parties from the Irish Troubles together in Boston at the Kennedy Library.

In Boston, Ruth-Ann enjoyed getting to know many Humphrey Fellows through joining them on several Humphrey trips, seminars, and international dinners. Being with the Humphrey Fellows continually reminded her of the many happy and productive years she had spent in Africa and Asia. She was always interested in the lives of Fellows and their families—she delighted in hearing the life stories that reflect the resilience of people, particularly women, who overcome great challenges and make important contributions to the well-being of others.

Ruth-Ann has made a lasting impact on the lives of hundreds of former students and colleagues around the world, many of whom have written touching remembrances of the ways in which she had influenced their lives. Numerous Humphrey alumni and staff at BU are among them.

During his tenure at BU—which coincided, for a time, with his unsuccessful 1990 run for governor of Massachusetts—he greatly expanded the campus, recruited top-notch faculty—including two future Nobel Prize winners—and established the University's 20-year partnership with the Chelsea Public School system. The University he served for so long awarded him an honorary degree at the 1995 Commencement ceremony.

Dr. Silber was fond of Hubert Humphrey's words, "... the moral test of government is how that government treats those who are in the dawn of life, the children; those who are in the twilight of life, the elderly; those who are in the shadows of life, the sick, the needy, and the handicapped." Dr. Silber not only brought the Humphrey Program to Boston University, he remained a good friend and strong supporter of the program throughout his life. We will always remember this great man.

#### FROM EL SALVADOR



2007/08 Fellow Lorena Dueñas Pacheco is working as Director of Research and International

Affairs of the El Salvador Financial System Superintendence (SSF). Among her many duties, she analyzes the financial system and advises on systemic risks. Lorena coordinates with the National Rules Committee on regulation of the financial system, and establishes internal procedures and a quality management system. She also monitors the introduction of international standards to the financial system and is in charge of coordinating relationships with other international entities and financial organizations around the world, including the World Bank, ATTF Luxembourg, IMF, and IDB. In the strategic arena, she leads the introduc-

tion of risk-based supervision into the Salvadoran financial system and the SSF strategic plan.

In August, Lorena's team invited Mari Carmen Aponte, the U.S. ambassador to El Salvador, to talk about responsibility. She delivered an inspirational speech, referring to her own experience as a professional and discussing what it means to bear the responsibility for overseeing the national financial system. More than 200 SSF staff members attended the event.

#### FROM HUNGARY



2011/12 Fellow Anita Székely writes, "Although I miss Boston and the whole 'Humphrey feeling'

at BU, I am working each day to continue this 'Humphrey feeling' in my life here in Hungary.

"Before I started to work in my job, I wrote

down my values related to my professional life. Based on this, and on my action plan elaborated in Boston, I am working on becoming a better leader. Last Thursday, I delivered a presentation at my Authority (the Hungarian Financial Supervisory Authority) to a large audience about my professional experience in the U.S. During my preparation, I was thinking about you several times. I was thinking about the values you taught me, about your professionalism, and also about the new ways of thinking I learned for how to approach challenging situations. Consequently, I was very relaxed, so the presentation was a real success with tons of appreciation. On top of that, the President of my Authority called me and we had a discussion. Based on my U.S. experience, he assigned me a task to implement some new ideas into the Hungarian banking supervision, in order to make it more efficient. This means that my stay in the U.S. was beneficial not just for me and my family, but for my country as well. Simultaneously, I have been promoted to Deputy Head of my 26-colleague department. Also, my article about the regulatory changes affecting the U.S. banking sector was published in a Hungarian banking journal in July."

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
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
