The goal of the Project has been to bring Catholic, Muslim, and secular scholars, intellectuals, and religious leaders into dialogue around common issues faced in biomedical ethics, including their impact upon understanding of the human person. The RIHA grants program has supported Professor Abdulaziz Sachedina's (George Mason University) research on the foundations and requirements of an Islamic Bioethics. Sachedina is an acknowledged leader in the Islamic world—a figure who commands respect among both Sunni and Shi'ite scientists, jurists, and scholars. He has been one of the world's leading advocates for the development of an Islamic bioethical tradition designed to complement the religio-legal reasoning that currently informs the decisions of Muslim experts in Islamic jurisprudence, or *fiqh*, with a rational-ethical mode of reasoning and discourse informed by an adequate grasp of the science behind the medical technologies. A significant portion of the RIHA grant has been expended in providing research and conference support for Professor Sachedina in anticipation of this new work, which will build upon his previous writings and extend his influence more broadly across the ummah, or global Islamic community.
