COURSE DESCRIPTION:

HI468 explores the political, social, and cultural developments from 1970 to the present. Topics include the end of the Vietnam War, the ghost of Vietnam, Watergate, détente, the rise of conservatism, Reagan's America, the end of the Cold War, the Clinton era, ideas of an American Empire, and the modern liberal/conservative divide.
