We will also explore its distinctive regional trajectory while considering its history in relationship to the nation as a whole.

Class Organization and Reading Quizzes:

We will meet for two class sessions every week. Each class will open with a brief quiz at exactly 3:33pm. If you arrive later than 3:34 you will not be permitted to take the quiz. The quiz will pose two short answer questions on the reading assigned for that day. The quizzes (20% of the final grade) create a consistent incentive structure in which you complete the reading as it is assigned, and are prepared to engage in discussions about the assigned material. The four lowest quiz scores will be dropped before calculating final grades. No make-up quizzes will be administered.

Writing Assignments:

There are five written assignments in addition to the quizzes. Guidelines for these assignments will be distributed well in advance of each deadline. No outside research is required for these assignments.

Attendance and Participation:

Attendance and class participation are 20% of the final grade. Attendance will be taken at the end of each class meeting. Every student is permitted four absences without questions or penalty. Each absence over four will result in reductions to the final grade. More than six total absences will result in a failing grade for the course.

There will be many opportunities to participate in class, from reacting to images and documents during a lecture, to discussing assigned readings with the entire class or within a small group. Bring the assigned books with you to class and come prepared to engage in a lively discussion. I will learn everyone's names within the first week of class, and record the level of each student's participation.
