# HI283A1: The Modern American Presidency Fall 2019 CAS 315, Tuesday/Thursday 12:30-1:45

#### **Overview:**

The presidency is perhaps the most important yet misunderstood office in the American government. On one hand, the president has tremendous ability to shape events and policy. On the other hand, it is surprising just how little power a president sometimes has in influencing events. HI 283 examines the development of the institution of the presidency from the election of William McKinley in 1896 to the present day. We will examine not only the careers of the presidents themselves, but also those that served in their administrations as well as the evolution of the Executive Branch. We will look at how presidents win elections, how they manage their administrations, how they deal with Congress, and how Americans perceive the office and its occupants.

### **Course Organization/Requirements:**
