## **Course Selection Questions:**

- 1) What are your professional goals?
  - **a.** If your interest is <u>Business/Corporate Law</u>, <u>Constitutional Law</u>, <u>Criminal Law</u>, <u>Health Law</u>, <u>Intellectual Property & Information Law</u>, or <u>International Law</u>, you should review the <u>Advice from Faculty</u>.
  - **b.** If you're still defining your professional goals, review the <u>Associate Deans' course selection memo</u>; use 2L classes for bar-related courses, graduation requirements, and to explore topics. Talk with mentors.
- 2) Which of the unique curricular offerings are you planning to explore? (<u>Study abroad</u>, <u>Semester-in-Practice</u>, <u>externships</u>, <u>dual-degree</u>, <u>certificate programs</u>, <u>concentrations</u>, the <u>Transactional Law Program</u>, the <u>Trial Advocacy program</u>, or classes in other BU graduate schools?)

If you want to engage in one of these unique programs, you may need to make a 2-year plan to ensure completion of graduation requirements, and a balanced academic experience.

- 3) How do you learn best? Are you balancing doctrinal, seminar and experiential courses?
- 4) How will you fulfill graduation requirements; while complying with non-GPA and in-class credit rules?
- 5) What subjects are tested on the bar exam for your chosen jurisdiction?
