#### **How to Prepare – The Basics**

- Read and brief cases from both sides
- Prepare responses to common questions, especially weaknesses
- Write out your introduction and conclusion and memorize them



### How to Prepare – Know your Case

- Record and facts
- Standard of review
- Key cases
- Apply the law to YOUR case



#### How to Prepare – Structure

- Start with a summary or a story
- Structure your argument
- Back up each point

#### How to Prepare – Believe It!

- Be confident
- Speak clearly
- Maintain eye contact
- Stand up straight
- Be still



### **The Best Way to Prepare?**

#### PRACTICE!

- Substance facts and cases
- Hypotheticals
- Body language and verbal tics
- Ask for help



#### **Mechanics – The Basics**

- Each side: 30 minutes
- Each speaker: 15 minutes
- Rebuttal (for Appellants/Petitioner): Up to 2 minutes

## Mechanics – Setting Up

- Arrive early, check in, head to courtroom
- Appellant on left, Appellee on right
- All rise, judges enter, all sit
- STAND UP when the clerk asks if ready and say YES



### **Mechanics – First Speaker**

- Clerk: "Appellant [Petitioner], commence your argument."
- First speaker for Appellant [Petitioner] goes to podium and begins



### **Mechanics – First Speaker**

- "May it please the court"
- Introduce yourself and partner.
- Explain what each of you will show
  - Briefly state your partner's issue
  - Give your issue in the form of your brief answer



## Mechanics – The Beginning

- Briefly outline your main points
- Tell the court what you want them to do (affirm, reverse)
- Begin your argument



#### **Mechanics – Facts?**

- First Appellant speaker: May ask court if it wants a brief recitation of the facts
- Appellee speakers: Mention facts only if the Appellant speaker for your issues discusses and misstates

### Mechanics – Second Speaker

- First speaker finishes and sits down
- Second speaker goes up to the podium
  - Introduce just yourself
  - Explain what you will show (your brief answer)
  - Start argument (using the same introduction techniques)



### Mechanics – Concluding

- Confidence! Last chance to "make a splash"
- Write out one or two sentences summarizing argument and . . .
- Memorize!



### **Mechanics – If Time Remains**

- Pay attention to time Once the "1 minute" card goes up, try to wrap up your argument/answer
- Move to your memorized conclusion
- Thank the judges
- Sit down



### Mechanics – If Time Runs Out

- Stop talking
- Acknowledge
- Thank the judges and sit
- Middle of answering?
  - Acknowledge, ask if you may finish, briefly finish



#### **Mechanics – Rebuttal**

- Only Appellants
- Only one team member
- ONLY for things that demand response
- Waive it if you do not need it



### **Conduct – Judicial Deference**

- Never interrupt
- Do not show frustration
- Listen carefully
- Take 3 seconds and think
- Eye contact



### **Conduct – Judicial Deference**

- NEVER argue with a judge
  - Listen to the question carefully
  - Disagree respectfully
  - Accept hypotheticals
  - Know when to concede



### **Conduct – General**

- Minimal, intentional hand gestures
- Be comfortable, but stand up straight
- Do not use "I" or "we"
- Never talk during someone else's argument



### Following the Round – Feedback

- Clerk will say "All Rise" stand
- Judges usually file out
  - Feedback from the bench
- Return to moot court reception area
- Get feedback and ask questions
