Homework

NOTE: Alternative individual project ideas will be considered by me, though not necessarily accepted. If you wish to do this, please contact me with a plausible alternative proposal as early in the semester as possible.

Graduate Students

- Students enrolled in this class as GRS LX705 will be required to complete certain additional assignments for this course. In particular, throughout the semester there will be a series of additional readings, taken either from more advanced text- or handbook presentations of the material, or from the primary literature itself. In addition to being responsible for the content of these readings, graduate students will also be required to submit, for each such reading, a critical summary and evaluation of the reading in question, between one and two pages double-spaced in length. Each summary, in addition to an overview and commentary on the reading, must present at least one “question for further study”, with a blueprint for follow up, that emerges from this reading.
