#### **Course Description**

This course examines the workings of diplomacy and the application of statecraft in international relations. The course will take a case study approach, examining different strategies, tactics, and problems in the conduct of foreign policy. The case studies will be based on historical events and the course will be organized chronologically.

#### **Objectives**

The objectives of this course are to impart an understanding of the mechanisms and process of diplomacy, to assess the utility of different approaches to the implementation of foreign policy, to analyze the success and failure of these approaches in different circumstances, and to consider the wider issues in their application to statecraft.
