The need to improve living standards, health, and quality of life for people throughout the developing world in an environmentally sound manner is a top priority for the global community. The three-semester GDP MA prepares students for development policy careers in government, nonprofit institutions, international organizations, and the private sector.

The multidisciplinary core curriculum trains students in the environmental, economic, public health, and governance aspects of international development. Students select a specialty track within the development field, giving them the opportunity to develop focused knowledge of the issues that they are most passionate about.

The MA in Global Development Policy requires a total of 48 credits divided among core development policy courses (16 credits), a final capstone course (4 credits), track coursework (minimum of 20 credits), and sufficient elective coursework to bring the student's credit total to at least 48 (typically 8 credits). Students also demonstrate proficiency in a foreign language.
