**Andrew Preston** is Reader in American History, Clare College, University of Cambridge. He is the author of two books: *The War Council: McGeorge Bundy, the NSC, and Vietnam* (2006) and *Sword of the Spirit, Shield of Faith: Religion in American War and Diplomacy* (2012). He is also the co-editor of *The Historical Journal* and has co-edited several books about the history U.S. foreign relations, politics, and religion.

Christopher Capozzola is Associate Professor of History at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.
