SUCCESSES OF THE BOSTON THEATER MARATHON!

Over the last two decades, selected ten-minute plays from the Boston Theater Marathon have been published in five Samuel French anthologies (BTMs 1-5), and the BTMs 11, 12, 13, 22, and 23 are available in the Smith and Kraus Publishers' anthologies. BTM plays have been translated into Dutch and published in The Netherlands (Anco E anthologies). Over the years, more than 25 BTM playwrights' full-length plays have been produced by the very companies who have sponsored their plays in the BTM. It's called "ten-minute dating," to coin a phrase, and the BTM has led to playwright/producer marriages.

IN MEMORIAM



ED BULLINS 1935-2021

Ed Bullins was a national treasure, a gifted playwright, and a great and wonderful friend to our Boston Theater Marathon. A member of the Black Arts Movement and the Minister of Culture with the Black Panthers, Ed was Playwright-in-Residence at the American Place Theatre in NYC where he founded the Bronx-based Surviving Theatre. He worked at the Public Theatre, the New York Shakespeare Festival, among others, all the while earning numerous awards for his work—an Obie for The Taking of Miss Janie, a NY Drama Critics Circle Award, a Guggenheim Fellowship, four National Endowment for the Arts grants, a Vernon Rice Award, .and two National Endowment for the Arts grants, among the many. His remarkable life played out all over the world. Here in Boston, he taught Playwriting at Northeastern University for a number of years. Naturally I begged him to put a play in our first BTM. I figured if people saw that Ed was a part of the BTM, they would want to be part of it as well. (I love being right.) His appearance lent an air of respectability to the event, and his play 8-Minute Marathon was produced by Centastage in our first BTM. I still remember that actor running for the entire 10 minutes (or was it eight?). Ed gifted us with a ten-minute play every year until his run ended with his Movement Two sponsored by Roxbury Crossroads Theatre in the BTM XXII. After that, Ed shied away from writing, but he left us with the memory of his generosity and commitment to the theatre. Over his years in Boston, he worked consistently with the indomitable Jacqui Parker of Our Place Theatre Project, a gifted playwright herself who has changed and continues to change the face of Boston theatre with her staunch support of the Black artists in Boston. Ed was a soft-spoken, mercurial, generous, and deeply committed theatre artist, and we miss having him in the world with us. He left an extraordinary legacy.

BTM XXIV PLAYWRIGHTS' BIOS

AMY ADLER's (Lemon Tart) short plays include Don't Pick Your Nose (BTM XII) and 6 Piece Chicken McNuggets (BTM XVI), which have been produced across the country. From class workshops to our Season of New Plays, BPT employs the best of New England's professional actors, directors, and designers to bring each playwright's vision to its first audiences.
