CHOOSING A HIGH SCHOOL Gospel Herald Printers

When a student has completed the grammar school grades a problem confronts him. He cannot successfully compete with those around him and handle his problems without at least a high school education. In this complex and trying age he needs the best. His high school, to be of real service to him, must not only teach him what other men have done and thought, but also what he must think and do if he would be what his Maker intends that he shall be.

The average high school can tell him what others have done and thought in matters of mathematics, science, and history; but it cannot, it dare not, teach him what others have done and taught in the realm of religion. It must not even explain to him what God has taught. The teacher is allowed to read portions of the Bible occasionally but not to comment upon them. He must not allow questions of religious duty to be discussed in his classroom.

The student is rigidly instructed in the proper course of action in matters of science, in what he must do and believe to be correct in the realms of mathematics, history, and the languages; but he is not taught what he must believe and do in his relation to God. (He does not know that this is because the Infidel, Catholic, and in some cases other religious people, oppose it.) Naturally, he comes to the conclusion that this is not very important after all—not important enough to be studied. His natural tendency is to drift away from religion. This he generally does unless stimulated by powerful Christian influences at home, and sometimes even then he drifts away from all but the empty form.

But this is not all. Not only is religious teaching kept out; but some of the teaching, especially in science and history—sometimes in other branches—is distinctly anti–religious. For instance; in Physiography, Botany, Zoology, and History the student comes to learn from noted [words missing] for their scholarship that the faith of his childhood is founded upon mistakes. He learns that the earth was not created, that it is millions of years older than the Bible shows, that man evoluted from the lower animals by [sic] slow process of development, that many of the old Testament accounts were simply borrowed from the superstitions of the Babylonians and Egyptians etc.

These things are thrust upon him at the age when his character is being moulded, at the age when he receives those impressions that remain with him through life and determine largely what kind of a life it shall be. And yet many fathers and mothers wonder why their sons and daughters have drifted away from the faith of their childhood!

How fortunate if those sons and daughters can be trained in a high school where all of the modern advantages and equiptments [sic] are found, in a high school which has the very highest rating with the higher institutions of learning, and yet where the teachers are Christians and CAN and DO teach DAILY reverence to God, faith in the Bible and true Christian living.

A large amount of the teaching found in the Universities of our land makes either direct or indirect thrusts at the plain teaching of the Bible. The theory of evolution in a radical form is made the basis of much of the teaching in science work, especially in Biology. Business men invest their money where they can get the largest returns on the dollar. No one would pay six dollars for exactly the same shoe he could buy across the street for five. A COMPARISON.

The greatest expense of a college education is found by educators to be not the tuition fees of the institution, but the really unnecessary expenditures, which to the college student appear necessary.

Any young man can go through college on less than \$25 per month. But how few do it! The boy enters school with a determination to "live close," and for the first month, perhaps, holds to his resolution. Then he begins to discover that his friends expect him to "set 'em up" once in a while and be "a good fellow" like the rest. He finds that if he would keep his social position, a new suit every few months must be forthcoming or he loses the respect of his friends. And thus the expenses double and re—double, till he is an exceptional college student who spends only \$25 a month. Most of them spend from \$30 to \$100.

SOME FACTS.

A few years ago a young man was sent to one of our free state institutions because, it was believed, the expense would be less than at a school where tuition was charged. The first year this young man spent nearly \$1200, the next year a little more!

The brother of this young man came to Cordell Christian College. During the first year he received a check each month for \$25, and had more than enough money for the entire year.

The young lady from a wealthy home who attended our school a few years ago was allowed two dollars a week for "pen money." [sic] The first year she chaffed greatly under this allowance; but the next, she fell under the influence of the school and lived on one dollar a week and regularly gave the other dollar to a poorer friend.

A young lady who was recently graduated from one of our state institutions gave some idea of the enormous cost of the free schools, when she said she was compelled to buy three expensive dresses for her graduation and the various receptions attending it. "But," she said, "this was only about half the expense to which the other girls went."

ONE REASON.

Most schools do not teach students the value of a dollar. Instead, in most cases, both the students and teachers encourage, by their example, extravagance and excess.

Cordell Christian College has always set itself against this tide of luxury and expense. The teachers see the need that boys and girls know the value of money, and they teach the students by word and deed to be simple and economical in dress and living. Year after year boys and girls that never before knew how to save money come under the influence of this teaching and become economical, saving men and women. It is easy to practice economy where all are economical, but hard where all are extravagant. This is why one boy spent \$1200 in a free school, and his brother spent \$200 in a school that charged tuition.

ANOTHER REASON.

The only large expense which students have in Cordell Christian College is the tuition fee of \$25 a semester for all high school and college students. This one expense, however, is fully counterbalanced by savings in other places. The graduation fee is \$5, in most schools it is \$10; tuition in special departments, Music, Expression, and Art is \$22.50 a semester, in most schools of equal value it is \$30 to \$45. Board is reduced to \$15 a month; it is almost impossible to find board in a school town for less money than \$20 to \$30. Societies and class organizations in every school are a constant and heavy expense to the student, so heavy that only a few students can bear it. In Cordell Christian College this unnecessary cost is curtailed and every student can easily meet the small fees of the societies. Taking into consideration the cost of board and rooms, of society work, of entrance fees, library fees, graduation fees, piano rent, and the many other expenses of a college education, Cordell Christian College will be found cheaper than most colleges that charge tuition.

QUALITY.

Not only are the expenses in Cordell Christian College lower than those of equal rank around it, but its instructors are as good, its work as efficient and thorough. As proof of the strength of the school we have the testimony of our State University, which accepts our work without question.

- (8) Cordell Christian College is situated in a town of medium size, large enough to afford all the advantages of city life and too small to contain all its vice. It is one of the cleanest towns morally in the state.

How to Begin

The best way for you to begin to select your college is to write a frank note to each [words missing] educational institutions which you contemplate entering. It would, perhaps, facilitate matters for you to state what work you have had, and whether you wish to specialize in any certain course or take regular college work.
