



Student Power Summer Students Take the CHCD to New Heights

From its inception, the China Historical Christian Database (CHCD) has been made possible by dedicated teams of students. Some students work for course credits, some participate as part of funded programs or internships, and more than a few have volunteered their time to help record the Christian history of China. From top to bottom, students make the CHCD possible.

This summer, the CHCD will be a hive of activity as students from around the globe contribute to the project. Thirty-three students from the University of Perugia, Carleton College, Boston University, Renmin University, and elsewhere will

be working to collect thousands of data points about Christian people, places and events. Dedicating over three thousand hours of their time, these students will grow the CHCD database by threefold, if not more.

One of the major goals for the summer is completing data retrieval on the *Directory of Protestant Missions in China*. Running from 1874 to 1950, the directory is the longest-running and most comprehensive reference source available on Protestant missionary activity in China. On the Catholic side, students will be working with a diverse number of sources in Latin, French, and English. These sources will help provide a clearer picture of Dominican, Franciscan, Passionist, and Jesuit activities in China into the 20th century.

With this raw student power, the CHCD is well-positioned to meet its goal of releasing an initial nation-wide data set by the beginning of 2022. At its release, the dataset will constitute the most comprehensive relational and geographic databases on Christianity in China to date. That achievement will be a testament to the immeasurable value of including students in the process of historical research. There is no power like student power!


Angel Donor’s \$50,000 Challenge Grant Opens Up New Possibilities

On November 19-21, 2020, the Center for Global Christianity and Mission (CGCM) convened a workshop on “Mapping Christianity in China, 1550-1950” that drew 266 scholars from 28 countries. The workshop served as the official public launch of the China Historical Christian Database.

Six weeks following the conference, the CGCM learned that an anonymous donor issued a challenge. The donor would match dollar for dollar every gift given to the CHCD up to \$50,000. When Daryl Ireland, the Associate Director of the Center for Global Christianity & Mission and the Co-Leader of the China Historical Christian Database heard the news, he kept repeating, “This is a game changer!”

The Mapping workshop made it clear that the CHCD needed to advance on several fronts. A software engineer would be required so that scholars can upload data into the system from anywhere in the world. A web designer would be needed so that end-users, who are not familiar with how to run queries in a Neo4j graph database, can still interact with the data in powerful, intuitive, and significant ways. Funds would be needed to support archivists and students rifling through stacks of missionary materials in libraries and archives around the globe.

It also became clear that the CHCD needed a project director. Someone must lead the negotiations with the dozens of institutions who are ready to partner on this project, train people how to enter data, and provide quality control. Yet, all of that seemed out of reach. The CHCD had used every penny of its \$5,662 start-up funds from the Hariri Institute for Computing and Computational Science & Engineering. But with the potential influx of \$100,000 from donations and matching funds, the ambitious dream to quantify and visualize 400 years of Christian history through the CHCD can become a reality. Big data can change the way we see and understand Chinese history.

On June 1, 2021, Dr. Alex Mayfield was hired as the Project Director for the CHCD.
