- 2011 Performance of Sophocles' *Ajax* by "Theater of War." I raised about \$12,000 in grant money to get the NYC-based "Theater of War" Drama Company to perform a production of Sophocles' *Ajax* at the Tsai Performance Center on 12-7-11 (Pearl Harbor Day). This was one of the most successful events in the 25 year history of the B.U. Core Curriculum. The show was sold out at Tsai (some 500 in attendance). My idea behind this project was to bring attention to the problem of suicide (1 per day) and PTSD in the U.S. military. I developed this project in coordination with the B.U. Core Curriculum. I was able to get the military brass from almost all the ROTC programs in the greater Boston area as well as many Iraq and Afghanistan vets. I raised the grant money from internal and external sources (at BU, from CAS Academic Enhancement Fund, Dean of Students, Center for the Humanities, Core Curriculum, School of Theology Office of the Dean of Community Life and Lifelong Learning, STH Center for Practical Theology, Dept. of Classical Studies; Red Sox Foundation, and Mass. General Hospital Home Base Program)

Creator of the annual Boston University Latin and Greek Contests. From 1994-2005 I ran these contests, collaborating with the Office of the President and the Offices of Admissions, Enrollment Services, and Conference Services to

stage this major outreach program between the Department of Classical Studies and over 1500 high schools in all six New England states as well as New York and New Jersey.

Our goal is to attract outstanding high school seniors to Boston University by means of a Latin and a Greek competition that awards roughly seven scholarships with an approximate value of \$500,000 each year. The contest results in the matriculation of many of these talented students and fosters undergraduate interest in a classical education. We invite the top 200 scorers and their parents to an on-campus banquet each November. Beyond the scholarship recipients the Contest attracts between 30-60 academically gifted students to the University each year.
