

Youth vs. Apocalypse Puts Working-Class Young People of Color at the Heart of the Climate Fight

"According to YVA, centering frontline youth means meeting fellow students where they are on the issues that impact them every day. Says Estrada, "We don't see the climate crisis as separate from colonialism or white supremacy, but a symptom of the same system. The climate crisis intersects other issues — food deserts, poverty, violence. We can't pretend we're not fighting these other traumas."

Hiring: Full Time, Summer Field & Lab Technician

Summer research in the Matthes Lab (Petersham, MA) focuses on measuring soils, streams, and trees to characterize the processes that produce and release carbon dioxide and methane and influence the cycling of carbon and other nutrients. The Technician will assist with field data collection and laboratory measurements of soil, leaf, and water nutrient and carbon chemistry at Harvard Forest, and will assist with data organization, documentation, and preliminary data analysis. Approx. 1-2 days of fieldwork, 1-2 days of labwork, and 1 day of computer work per week. \$20/hour for 40 hours/week over 13 weeks. 
