Visions Beyond an Apocalypse

Science Fiction Writers Explore Better Climate Endings. By Jonita Davis

"Climate science fiction, or "cli-fi," is having a renaissance...

But not all of these stories are grim post-apocalyptic journeys after climate catastrophes. In fact, a particular kind of cli-fi with themes of hope, resilience, and renewal has existed for years. Until recently, it's been the purview of authors from communities that are underrepresented in publishing. These books offer a new and socially responsible look at what Earth could be like after an apocalyptic event—written by authors who were already living in spaces damaged by climate change and who had survived horrors in real life."

<u>Climate Conversations Presents:</u> Indigenous Perspectives on Just Transitions

The Climate Conversations team interviews Dr. Kyle Powys Whyte, a Professor of Philosophy and Community Sustainability at Michigan State, about indigenous views of climate change and climate justice.

Dr. Whyte outlines how the legacy of colonialism, capitalism, and other systems of domination affected indigenous populations in North America.

He also discusses potential just climate solutions that respect indigenous traditions, while amplifying the voices of contemporary indigenous peoples. He goes on to talk about current work being done by indigenous scientists and environmentalists.

Interested in his perspective on cli-fi? Here's a journal article where Dr. Whyte writes about how the apocalypse already happened for indigenous people - and cli-fi needs to recognize that.
