- Students must fulfill the calculus requirement for the major prior to enrolling in EC201.
- QST QM221 Probabilistic and Statistical Decision Making for Management, or MA115, or MA213 are acceptable substitutes for EC203.
- All 500-level and above economics courses are graduate-level courses. Special permission from the instructor is required for undergraduates wishing to take these courses.
- Departmental approval of transfer courses is required. Petitions for approval must be submitted to the Economics Department. Students must submit a Transfer Course Equivalency Form, found on the department's Undergraduate Student Resources website, along with a copy of the course syllabus.
