Graduate Financial Aid Application

Graduate financial aid from the African Studies Center may be provided in two forms, the *Foreign* Language Area Studies (FLAS) fellowship and Graduate School of Arts and Sciences (GRS) aid.

Only US citizens and permanent residents are eligible for FLAS fellowships. Recipients are required to enroll in one African language course and one area studies course each semester of the award period. The graduate fellowship is equal to an \$18,000 tuition waiver and a \$15,000 living stipend for the award year plus health insurance (total of \$33,000).

GRS financial aid may include an award for continuing fees, tuition, GSU fees, and/or a stipend, depending on the graduate student's status in their degree program. An award for GRS continuing student fees is only available to students who have completed their coursework and can only be awarded for a total of two years. GRS tuition awards may be applied to one or two semesters during an academic year. A GRS stipend award in varying amounts is meant to contribute to a student's living expenses and requires 10-15 hours of service to the African Studies Center each week of the award.

For incoming students, documents that are required at both the African Studies Center and the Graduate School may be submitted as photocopies to the African Studies Center.

DEADLINE: Submit the requirements listed in the checklist below by <u>February 15</u> for the following academic year to Joanne Hart, Room 514, 232 Bay State Road.

The following items must be in your file to be considered. *Incomplete files will automatically disqualify you from consideration.*

You may ask the department to which you have applied to forward your letters of reference, transcripts, and test scores to the African Studies Center.

- □ A 250-word statement of purpose. This statement should describe your specific academic interests and your career goals and plans and if applying for FLAS, describe your specific interests in studying an African language.
- □ African language questionnaire (if applying for a FLAS)
- **T**wo letters of reference
- Transcripts from all colleges or universities previously attended
- **D** TOEFL scores (if TOEFL is required for admission to your program)
- GRE, GMAT, LSAT or MCAT scores

Previous applicants:

- □ African Studies Center financial aid application
- □ Most recent transcript
- African Language Questionnaire (if you are applying for a FLAS)
- □ If goals have changed since previous application, provide an updated statement
- □ Progress report written by your advisor noting updated status of your coursework /qualifying exams/research proposal

You will not be considered if you have two or more incompletes on your record resulting from failure to complete course requirements. You will be considered only prejudicially if you have one incomplete.
