


What is plagiarism? What words come to mind when you hear the term?

Plagiarism is presenting someone else's words or ideas as if they were your own.



Plagiarism Myths?

- 1. As long as you mention the author's name, it's okay to use some of their words.
- 2. You don't have to cite if you're just using your course textbook.
- 3. Using two or three of the author's words together is okay; it's only plagiarism if you use four or more of their words.
- 4. If you change every word in a sentence to paraphrase it, you are safe.

Plagiarism?

- 1. In particular, the development of demonstrations for advanced undergraduate audiences, interactive problem solving, red—green voting systems, and fascinating-fact segments are all highlighted.
- 2. Especially, the creation of experiments for junior and senior students, creative ways of solving problems, colorbased ranking methods, and interesting-fact breaks are all explained.
- 3. This study discusses several different types of lecture breaks in an undergraduate chemistry classroom, including brief demonstrations, problems, and polls.

Avoiding Plagiarism

- 1. Avoid copy-and-paste "note taking."
- 2. Practice summarizing without looking at the text.
- 3. Have a system for notes and research--and use it!
- 4. Have a system for marking quotations and citations in your papers.
- 5. Don't "save the citations for the end" when writing a paper.
- 6. Use BU and online resources for help.
- 7. Ask questions if you're unsure.
