ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program was established in 1978 by President Jimmy Carter to honor the late Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and his life-long commitment to international cooperation and public service. The program invites experienced professionals from designated countries to spend a year in the U.S. preparing to address several of the most compelling development issues in the world today. Humphrey Fellows are selected based on their leadership potential, commitment to public service, and professional expertise.

Today's Humphrey Fellow alumni network comprises over 6,000 influential leaders worldwide. This is a Fulbright exchange activity, primarily funded by Congress and administered by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) at the U.S. Department of State, with administrative assistance provided by the Institute of International Education (IIE).



THE PROGRAM AT BOSTON UNIVERSITY

Boston University has operated as a host campus since the Program's inception in 1978. The Questrom School of Business serves as the program's administrative home at BU. where all twelve 2019-2020 fellows specialize in finance and economic development. Under the guidance of program coordinators and faculty advisors, fellows pursue individualized programs of non-degree, graduatelevel coursework, independent research, special seminars and colloguia, and six-week, professional affiliations related to their respective fields. The Humphrey Fellowship Program has contributed to BU's development into one of the world's most globally connected private universities, where more than 7,000 international students live and study. As of 2019, the BU Humphrey alumni network exceeds 500 members in over 120 countries.

SEMINARS

Innovation & Leadership with Prof. Peter Marton

On January 27th, the Fellows met with Peter Marton, a Strategy and Innovation professor at the Questrom School of Business. They discussed innovation, entrepreneurship, and leadership to kick off the semester!

FINANCIAL INCLUSION AND SOCIAL IMPACT CONFERENCE

On February 20, The Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program at Boston University, in collaboration with Questrom's Susilo Institute for Ethics in the Global Economy, hosted their first public conference, Reshaping the World 2020: Financial Inclusion and Social Impact, in celebration of over 40 years of the Humphrey program at BU!

The event brought together almost 100 researchers, practitioners, policymakers, students, and the greater Boston community, to talk about the in which financial inclusion can promote gender equality, reduce poverty, and stimulate economic growth.

This is a hot topic among current BU fellows, who all specialize in banking and finance. Alumni fellows were able to attend the conference as well, representing five different countries and fellowship years from 1988 to 2012!







FINANCIAL INCLUSION AND SOCIAL IMPACT CONFERENCE







The event kicked off with the Dean's welcome highlighting some of Humphrey alum's achievements followed by the keynote speech from CGAP, the World Bank's think tank for financial inclusion.

Dora Perjesi (current BU Fellow, Hungary) and Sujeev Shakya (2002 – 2003 BU Fellow, Nepal), served as panelists with representatives from the Eastern Bank and BU's Economics Department, to discuss the capacity of financial literacy and digitization programs to reduce poverty, promote entrepreneurship, and enhance government implementation of social programs.

At the end of the day, attendees participated in a poster session and networking reception, where three current fellows (Sandip Ghosh, Bangladesh; Stella Machel, Mozambique; and Chernet Yimer, Ethiopia) presented strategies to foster inclusive financial ecosystems. The event provided a forum for fintech stakeholders to start a dialogue on how these challenges are being handled across sectors.
