1.Course Description

As the most populous country in the world, China has experienced a rapid increase in its rural migrant population since the early 1980s, when the reform of the household registration (hukou) system was on the agenda. Due to the large number of rural laborers leaving the countryside to work in urban areas, China has undergone the largest and fastest urbanization in the world. This course starts from introducing the evolution of spatial patterns of internal migration and reasons for migration; and tries to illustrate the characteristics and wellbeing of the migrants; finally evaluates the impacts of the migration on urbanization and regional development.

2.Course Objectives

This course aims to introduce the patterns, motivations, and impacts of population migration, and illustrate the interaction between migration and urbanization. Investigations into these questions may provide students with a deeper understanding on China's contemporary society.
