¹ US Legal Culture is mandatory for all students whose IELTS or TOEFL scores do not meet the one-year requirement, 7.0 or 100, respectively. Two-Year track students whose language scores meet the one-year requirement may select to enroll in US Legal Culture or select an alternative option offered by the program director.

² Advanced Oral Advocacy is a one-credit, optional course for fall start students. We will consult you during orientation regarding your decision to enroll in this course, and if you decide to take the course, our program will enroll you. Course Description: Using a hypothetical based on a current U.S. Supreme Court case, students will learn how to identify and prioritize issues, use precedent effectively, and create a roadmap for an argument. The first half of the course will focus on drafting a persuasive outline, followed by training on the methods and techniques that lawyers use to convince a judge or jury through oral advocacy. Students will engage in numerous practice oral arguments that will be critiqued by the instructor and their peers. The culminating activity will be participation in the LLM Internal Moot Court Competition where students will be judged by an independent panel.

³ Academic Workshops and Review Sessions are mandatory. This semester they will encompass a 3-part workshop series on AI Skills Development. The sessions will address ethical considerations, academic

integrity, and practical ways to use AI as a learning tool. More information will be available in your course calendar for U.S. Legal Discourse, which will be provided to you at orientation.
