

Learn from Anywhere (LfA)

- Flexibility and choice on how to balance your desire for an oncampus experience with concerns you may have about exposure to COVID-19.
- Blended, simultaneous in-person and remote modality enables students to participate in the classroom or engage remotely whenever is necessary
- Professors will manage the number of students in classroom spaces at any one time
- NOTE: LfA is for on campus courses and is distinctly different from MET's ONLINE course offerings:
 - 14 vs. 7 week terms
 - Online courses are marked with an "O"
 - Both on campus (LfA) courses AND online courses are available for enrollment by ALL MET students. Any combination of modalities should be discussed with an academic advisor due to scheduling differences.

- LfA status must be updated to be in compliance
- If planning to come to campus, you won't be able to enter classes if this status does not indicate on-campus
- InClassLfA Web App: To reserve seats in class
- Study Space Web-Based App: To reserve oncampus study space

- I am in a BU residence or "rooming style" BU rental property (90 St. Mary's Street, 183 Bay State Rd, 850 Beacon Street or 210 Riverway)
- □ I am in the Boston area in a non-BU property, or a BU rental property (other than those listed above)
- I am in the United States but not in the local Boston area
- I am not living in the United States

Attendance

How are you currently attending class?

- I am attending class and other academic commitments in person more than once a week
- I am attending class or other academic commitments on campus no more than once a week
- I am coming to the CRC, Medical, or Fenway Campus regularly for a purpose other than class
 OR
 - my on-campus employment or service obligations require interaction with other students and community members
- I am attending class remotely only and not coming to campus for any other purpose

- Healthway Portal: www.bu.edu/healthway
- COVID-19 testing:
 - Review <u>'arrival testing' chart</u>
 - Non-Massachusetts residents must complete MA Travel Form
 - Quarantine (if no negative test) or 'stay-in-place' for 72 hours
 - Schedule 1st on-campus test. Series of 2 tests over 7-8 days
 - Login to healthway to schedule an appointment (can do so up to 7 days in advance)
 - Results shared in <u>Healthway portal</u> within 24 hours
 - Graduate students need 2 negative tests (3 for undergraduate students)
 - Frequency of testing thereafter varies upon 'category' from LfA status response
 - Medical intervention & contact tracing for confirmed cases of COVID-19



Spring 2021 On-campus Learning

- **Daily reporting** required within Healthway app (*including a declaration of not coming to campus' unless you are EXCLUSIVELY remote*).
- While on campus:
 - Required PPE (face masks) for all faculty, staff, & students
 - Physical distancing protocols in all buildings.
 - Show "green badge" to enter buildings & classrooms (received based on testing requirements & self-reported symptoms).





STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS



Class Attendance

This is a prerequisite to success. Going to class in person or remotely facilitates learning in several ways:

- Lectures and classes supplement reading assignments
- Professors use questions or classroom discussions to enhance critical thinking skills
- Professors may emphasize important concepts so you know what is important and what to focus on
- Facilitates interaction with the professor and classmates

Classroom Etiquette

- Technology download software or tools beforehand
- Engagement:
 - Come prepared to contribute to classroom discussions.
 - Engage with the material ahead of time, formulating questions, and preparing topics for discussion where appropriate.
 - Your opinion and ideas are a critical part of the learning process.
 - Take advantage of outside class resources.
 - Online learning tips from Office of Distance Education (ODE)
- Embrace informality. Don't be afraid ask questions.
- Limit the use of personal electronic devices to note taking exclusively.
 Respect others by keeping your private conversations to a minimum.
- Remember; you are embarking on graduate level studies and have a big responsibility in the role you play in your own learning.

Other Strategies for Success

- Form a study group with other classmates
- Make a weekly schedule and balance homework and study with personal time
- Follow deadlines. Don't fall behind on your academic work
- Ask for help
 - Make use of Faculty office hours to ask for clarification or to review class material
 - Utilize other university resources (ERC, academic/department advisors)






