Boston University Alum Among First Peace Corps Volunteers to Return to Service Overseas

BOSTON – Boston University alum Hallie Nothmann is among the first Peace Corps volunteers to return to overseas service since the agency's unprecedented global evacuation in March 2020. The Peace Corps suspended global operations and evacuated nearly 7,000 volunteers from more than 60 countries at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The Peace Corps mission of 'meeting the moment' is what attracted me most to becoming a volunteer. I wanted to utilize my academic and experiential knowledge to facilitate global connection, community-building, and action-oriented engagement. I am eager to be part of an agency that centers host community's voices and values human connection as a catalyst for equity and empowerment," Nothmann said. "I am most looking forward to learning from and living with my host family and community!"

Nothmann graduated in 2022 with a bachelor's degree in international relations. She will serve as an environment volunteer in Panama.

The volunteer cohorts are made up of both first-time volunteers and volunteers who were evacuated in early 2020. Upon finishing a three-month training, volunteers will collaborate with their host communities on locally prioritized projects in one of Peace Corps' six sectors – agriculture, community economic development, education, environment, health or youth in development – and all will engage in COVID-19 response and recovery work.

Currently, the agency is recruiting volunteers to serve in 56 countries around the world at the request of host country governments, to connect through the Peace Corps' grassroots approach across communities and cultures. Volunteers have already returned to a total of 48 countries around the world. The Peace Corps continues to monitor COVID-19 trends in all of its host countries and will send volunteers to serve as conditions permit. Americans interested in
