

Consent and Sex Positivity Digest

What is sexual assault (SA)?

Any sexual activity where consent is not informed or freely given

SA covers a range of coercive behaviors which violate both state legal statutes and BU's Disciplinary Code



SA includes any physical sexual contact that occurs without consent, through coercion, or by force

Sexual assault falls under the umbrella term of sexual violence
