The Religion and Conflict Transformation (RCT) program is a seminary-based program in theologically informed conflict transformation. It trains religious leaders in the theologies, theories, and practices of conflict transformation.

Focus on multicultural and interfaith contexts: In all its programs, the RCT Program attempts to embody in its practice the possibility of a pluralistic peace via practices of learning, ritual, and community. All core courses include multicultural representation and content from diverse faith communities. Rooted in Protestant Christian traditions, the Program has graduated practitioners of Catholicism, Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Unitarian Universalis, African Traditional Religions, and Buddhism, as well as those who do not practice a religious tradition. There are few programs in the world with the combination of racial, national, and religious diversity that exists here.

Emphasis on spiritual practices: The RCT Program is a practical one and works from the assumption that effective peacebuilding, especially in multicultural and interreligious contexts, requires attention to spiritual practices, rituals, and community formation. Other programs emphasize theological reflection and minimize training in practical application. The RCT

Program holds critical theological reflection in balance with practical learning and practice to graduate both reflective and effective practitioners of conflict transformation.

Emphasis on Restorative Justice and Community Organizing: The RCT Program at BU has particular strengths in restorative justice and in community organizing. Thus, in addition to the core required course “The Spirit and Art of Conflict Transformation” students are required to take either “The Principles and Practices of Restorative Justice” or “Faith-Based Community Organizing for Justice and Peace” or an equivalent at their home institution. In addition, there are multiple practical and internship opportunities in these areas at BU and in the greater Boston area. There are places with emphases in either restorative justice or community organizing but there is no other place that weaves them together in the ways they are in the RCT Program.

RCT internships include opportunities to work in the office in communications, networking, and administrative projects, developing RCT-specific programming, or facilitating community talking circles within STH or beyond.

Capuchin Mobile Ministries (CMM) is a ministry of spiritual caregiving to our homeless neighbors that bring the welcome of Christ to Boston and Cambridge through our outreach van. We conduct outreach trips three days a week, Sundays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays, to the places where the homeless congregate in Boston and Cambridge. We offer students the opportunity to work directly with people experiencing homelessness, substance abuse issues, and mental health challenges. We challenge intern chaplains not to be evangelizers or problem solvers but

to be witnesses to the dignity and sacred worth of each person they encounter on the streets. We work not to engage in transactional (giver-taker) relationships but in transformational relationships characterized by generosity, compassion, mercy, and forgiveness.

On the van we provide coffee, sandwiches, and other street necessities. Each trip starts with two chaplains and three volunteers at our house in Jamaica Plain (off the orange line). This internship will focus not only on learning strong chaplaincy skills but also nonprofit management, volunteer engagement, communications, and development.

Emerson College's Center for Spiritual Life is an inclusive, interfaith hub for religious and spiritual programming, support, and education. Emerson College is an institution that offers undergraduate and graduate programs in communications, the arts, media, and liberal arts and is a space for creative expression, passion, and exploration by students. The school has a diverse student body that contains a large number of queer students, in particular. We are looking for contextual education students to act as assistant chaplains. This could mean either working with our students to support either a specific religious community campus (we would love to have support with our Muslim or Catholic communities) or by serving the interfaith community on campus, and in particular, the many students at Emerson who would consider themselves spiritual, but not religious.

In this role, students would work with the Director of Spiritual Life, Rabbi Lisa Eiduson, as well as the campus's Jewish chaplain (Rabbi Elli Pripas) and Protestant chaplain (Brian Indrelie) to serve Emerson's student body, for example:

- co-planning and executing Emerson's interfaith retreat
- advising a student faith or interfaith organization
- supporting campus celebrations across faiths
- leading a faith community fair for LGBTQ+ students
- providing pastoral care to students
- bringing your own voice and interests to what spiritual life could look like on campus.

We're particularly thinking this year about the intersection of spirituality and creativity, and considering how to bring programming to students that supports them in exploring this connection. Emerson College is highly accessible. In the winter of 2004, four Korean families attending an American church in Lexington, Boston, gathered together and began studying the Bible with a heart that yearned for the Word. At that time, Pastor Han-Sung Kim, who had been studying the Bible with us, received a calling to establish a church and shared his thoughts, and together with the families who had been studying the Bible, the first service of Vision Church was held at Boston University Marsh Chapel on August 6, 2006. As the congregation gathered for the Friday all-night prayer meeting and the seminary students studying at nearby Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary devoted themselves and prayed, the small but God-dreamed-of hope for a church began to take shape. After that, with the prayers and support of the New Jersey United Church (Pastor Na Gu-Yong) and the Korean United Methodist Church Ministry Strengthening Association, we held a founding music service on October 22, 2006 at Calvary UMC in Arlington, inviting Bishop Peter Weaver and other superintendents and pastors, marking our first step as a church affiliated with the New England Conference of the United Methodist Church. In order to more effectively

fulfill the mission of serving the youth of the Boston area, we moved our worship place to Grace UMC, a historic American United Methodist church located in Cambridge, in November 2007. Also, with the determination and love of the Grace UMC members, we decided to unite and become one church, and in April 2008, we were reborn as Grace Vision UMC and made a new beginning. Since then, in order to accommodate the increasing number of members and to pursue a new calling, the church has moved to a sanctuary in Watertown, near Boston, and is now 16 years old. Grace Vision Church was planted in Boston through the devotion of the first pastors, Han-Sung Kim, Wi-Hyun Jang, Jong-Wook Hong, and Choong-Ho Lee, as well as the prayers, service, and obedience of many members and ministers. And it has grown into a community that serves Christ as the main character in the Word of God. Now, in July 2022, we are continuing to write the gospel story of the kingdom of God revealed in the Word together with those who have been called to Boston as pilgrims in the kingdom of God in Christ, together with Pastor Koo Jeong-hoon, who was sent by the New England Conference and has taken up his post.

We employ a tried-and-true technique called photovoice, which combines amateur photography and structured dialogue. It isn't something we invented. Our innovation is developing ways to use photovoice as an arts-based approach to interfaith understanding. Our work brings together people from different backgrounds to explore what their beliefs, practices, and values look like in everyday life. Participants snap photos with their smartphones

to show the ways religion and spirituality “show up” during a typical week. They meet together to share and discuss their pictures.

As conversations unfold, participants find common ground in experiences such as encountering the divine through nature. They recognize shared commitments to regular practices such as prayer and meditation. And they open up about the barriers they encounter as people with commitments to beliefs and behaviors they hold as sacred. Through this process, people involved in our projects develop understanding, empathy, and a shared vision for what a more inclusive world might look like.

Since religion is embodied, people bring with them differences including race, class, gender, and political affiliation. As such, opportunities for building interfaith relationships, for example, also helps to bridge other differences and can address a host of challenges related to equity, diversity, and inclusion. We do this through photovoice workshops, projects, trainings, as well as photo contests and related blogs.

Student would be the Diversity, Dialogue, & Interfaith Engagement Intern. One internship pathway is to facilitate a project on your own campus or in your local community. The project will conclude with a public facing component that will share the work with a larger audience (such as social media, an exhibit, a webpage, etc.). You will help collect, edit, and write stories based on your group’s experience as well as one case study on the photovoice method as an approach to interreligious engagement. Tasks could include participation in a photovoice project and workshops, writing and editing blogs, the creation of a case study based on one’s own experience in the project group, social media content creation and management, research and research summaries, outreach, and facilitation.

There is a lot of potential and many opportunities for a contextual education student to get involved and take significant and substantive leadership roles in helping to build new programming and gain hands-on ministry experience. We are eager to offer Bible study programming for youth and adults, develop youth programming during worship and at other times during the week. We are hoping to expand our music offerings including restarting a

regular church choir, building a handbell choir, reviving our Hallelujah Choir, which has been led primarily by our Cameroonian members. There is room for much more and creativity and new ideas are very welcome.

Key activities where student support would be very much welcome include: worship planning and leading, planning and leading our weekly Wednesday evening prayer service and/or developing additional programming, preaching on Sundays, developing adult Bible study/programming before or after worship on Sundays and/or other days of the week, youth programming, weekly children's messages, prayer groups, small groups, administrative tasks (website, newsletter, bulletin preparation), pastoral care, outreach and new membership development, developing opportunities to engage our community, and online programming to engage with our community who cannot physically come to worship due to health conditions or physical distance.

This church would be a good fit for someone who is interested in pastoral/congregation care at the local church level. This would include accompanying the pastor on pastoral visits and/or community building opportunities, assisting with worship planning, access to preaching opportunities if desired, observing the administrative responsibilities of clergy, theological reflection, and ministry exploration and experimentation.
